The survey is online, takes around 20 minutes to complete, and can be accessed at a time that suits you on most devices. It is also available in a range of languages other than English.




LC18

The students participated with enthusiasm in our community excursions, which included Bowling, Gymnastics, visits to Westfield, and trips to the Mill Park All Abilities Playground. In cooking sessions, they enjoyed preparing a variety of delicious treats such as chocolate cookies, Nutella pinwheels, toastie snacks, and pizza muffins.


