Community Access at Lalor

At the Lalor campus, students are regularly engaging with the community to apply their skills and knowledge beyond the classroom. Each excursion rationale is linked to the curriculum and specific to the needs and focus of each class. In Week 1, many classrooms visited Reading Cinemas Epping to watch the new Minecraft movie. Other excursions planned by the school and classroom teachers this term include visits to Preston Market, sailing, Hoop City, Woolworths, NGV, bowling, Bounce, Mill Park All Abilities Park, Lalor Neighbourhood House and the Police Museum.

Creating a Child Safe Environment at Northern School for Autism

At Northern School for Autism, the safety and wellbeing of our students is our highest priority. As part of our commitment to child safety, we uphold the Victorian Child Safe Standards, which guide us in fostering a secure and supportive environment for all students. This month, we focus on Standard 3: Empowering Children and Young People.

What is Standard 3?

Standard 3 emphasizes the importance of student voice and agency in creating a child-safe culture. This means that children and young people should be empowered to participate in decisions that affect them, know their rights, and feel confident to speak up if they have concerns.

How We Implement Standard 3 at Northern School for Autism:

- Student Voice & Leadership: We provide opportunities for students to express their ideas and opinions through student leadership groups, classroom discussions, and give students the opportunity to make choices throughout the day.
- Education on Rights & Safety: Our wellbeing programs incorporate lessons on personal safety, respectful relationships, and self-advocacy, ensuring students understand their rights.
- Encouraging Open Communication: We foster a school culture where students feel safe to speak to trusted adults about any concerns they may have.
- Inclusive Practices: We ensure that every student, regardless of ability, background, or personal circumstances, is heard and valued.

How Families Can Support This Standard: Families play a key role in empowering children to speak up and be involved in decisions affecting them. You can support your child by:

- Encouraging open conversations about their school experiences and feelings.
- Reinforcing the message that their voice matters and they have the right to feel safe.
- Helping them identify trusted adults they can speak to if they need support.

Together, we can create a school environment where every child feels safe, heard, and respected. If you have any questions about our child safety policies, please feel free to reach out to any member of the leadership team.

Enrolment Policy

The updated enrolment policy can be found on the Northern School for Autism website at https://www.northernautism.vic.edu.au/policies-protocols. A reminder: students are entitled to 13 years of schooling. Therefore, students will graduate from Northern School for Autism after their 13th year of schooling or the year they turn 18, whichever comes first. Students who begin their schooling in another setting are still entitled to a total of 13 years of schooling. For example, a student starting at NSA in Year 2 will only have 11 years of schooling with us, as they have already completed 2 years at another school.

Medication Changes

If your child has had a medication change over the holiday period, please notify your child's teacher and contact the school office for an updated Medication Authority Form. The school is unable to make changes in administering prescription medication at school unless we have a signed Medication Authority Form from the doctor. If you have any concerns, please give the office a call and ask to speak to a member of the Leadership Team.


State School Relief

MATHS FOCUS: SHAPE AND LOCATION

This week, students explored shapes and location through hands-on activities like sorting 2D and 3D shapes and using positional language such as "above" and "next to." They also enjoyed an outdoor scavenger hunt, identifying shapes in the environment and connecting classroom learning to real life. These activities are helping students build a strong understanding of geometry and spatial awareness in an interactive and engaging way.

ENGLISH

The Little Learners Love Literacy program helps students develop strong reading and writing skills through fun, interactive phonics-based activities. It focuses on core vocabulary, lettersound relationships, and word blending, ensuring students build confidence as early readers. Through structured lessons, students are gaining essential literacy skills in an engaging and handson way.

SCIENCE

In science, students have been learning about electricity and circuits, exploring how electrical energy flows through wires to power devices. They created simple circuits using batteries, wires, and bulbs to understand the basic components of a circuit. These hands-on activities help students grasp the concepts of conductors, insulators, and how circuits work to complete an electrical path.

This term, students have offsite activities such as indoor sports, where they will developed teamwork and physical skills, and STEAM building sessions that fostered creativity and problem-solving. Additionally, local walks provided a hands-on learning experience, allowing students to explore their surroundings and connect with nature.


